This APPEAL follows on from the APPEAL of the 26/4/2016, which prompted 400 initiatives around the world

Context

On the 26th of April 1986, the Chernobyl disaster started. Despite having been analysed, commented on and filmed for 35 years, this major event in our contemporary history remains *"an enigma yet to be solved for the 21st century"*, according to Svetlana Alexievitch, winner of the 2015 Nobel prize for literature.

It is precisely her text, *The Chernobyl Prayer*, published in 1997 and since translated into many languages, which has helped many readers around the world become aware of the pernicious consequences of this technological and human disaster, a disaster from which there is no going back.

Regularly adapted for the theatre, radio and cinema, this tragic narrative has inspired numerous symposia, articles, novels, interviews... and controversies.

Starting as an ordinary love story, the first excerpt from *The Chernobyl Prayer*, gradually transports us into the heart of a technological disaster that is unprecedented in the history of humankind.

The simple testimony of a young woman about her firefighter husband, soon turns into an epic story. On duty that night, her husband, with fourteen colleagues, attempted in vain to extinguish what they had been told was an "ordinary fire" in the fourth reactor of the Lenin Power Plant.

Irradiated from the very first minutes, the agony of his radiation sickness lasted for fourteen days, drawing him into the

heart of irrationality, terror, and passionate love. Fourteen hallucinatory days that were not only devastating for him and his wife and for their families and friends but also for Medicine, Science, Political Power and Military Power. In the Soviet Union and the rest of the world. **This "Hymn to Love**" deserves to be sung everywhere on Earth by a gigantic choir of women.

Do you enjoy reading or speaking aloud? If so, then wherever you are in the world, between 6pm on the 25th of April and midnight on the 26th of April 2021, at the time of your choice, read or act the excerpt *A Lone Human Voice* from *The Chernobyl Prayer* by Svetlana Alexievitch.
